- Floyd Worley has moved up in state government and is now an Executive Assistant to the Governor.


- Seana Murphy has been named the new Director of the Twenty-first Scholars program. She was formerly the Deputy Director.


Please keep Dale Purvis, spouse of IUPUI's Kathy

President Jeff Pethick called the meeting to order at 10 a.m.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The minutes from January 23, 2003 Executive Committee meeting were distributed and reviewed. The following correction will need made to the minutes:

Marvin Smith motioned to accept the minutes with corrections. Doug Irvine seconded. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Treasurer's report was distributed and reviewed. Doug Irvine motioned to accept the report as given. Maralee seconded. Motion carried.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Jeff attended the MASFAA Executive Council Meeting in Charleston, WV. MASFAA would like to promote membership within individual state organizations. Jeff will compose an article for the ISFAA newsletter.

The state conference exchange program has been created. The host state will cover the cost of registration and lodging. MASFAA will pay travel expenses. A representative from the state of lowa will attend the ISFSAA Spring 2003 conference. David Fevig will attend the Illinois meeting later in the spring.

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The current edition of the ISFAA by-laws has been corrected/revised. The correct edition is on the ISFAA web site.

The National Guard has expressed an interest in attending ISFAA financial aid nights. Each individual high school will be responsible for inviting the National Guard if they are so inclined.

It has been brought to the attention of the Executive Committee that ISFAA had not been given proper credit for College Goal Sunday in marking initiatives. The College Goal Sunday Co-Chairs will work with Lumina to credit ISFAA in College Goal Sunday. Michele Neff, CGS Co-Chair will meet with Lumina to discuss the possibility of presenting CGS at the NASFAA conference in July. An Indiana representative would need to be available for this presentation

COMMISSIONERS' REPORTS

Training and Development Training Committee

The NASFAA spring workshop was held Monday, March 17, 2003 at the Sallie Mae facility in Fishers, Indiana. Jacki Switzer, Ivy Tech State College-Terre Haute and Debra Wilson, Purdue University presented Consortium Agreements Among Eligible Institution, Debt Management: Strategies, Options, and Implications, and Federal Work-Study: Promoting Community Service. There were 18 people in attendance plus the 2 trainers. Thirteen sets of material were sold to attendees and 2 people who could not attend have asked to purchase materials. Sallie Mae provided a very nice continental breakfast and beverages throughout the day.

The remaining sets of materials will be offered for sale. Since each module was shrink-wrapped separately, they can be offered for sale that way, also, at \$15 per module.

Financial information is not currently available due to the fact that some of the data is missing. An update is forthcoming regarding the financial status of the training. Despite not having that information available, a loss can be projected based on the number of attendees since the materials are sold at cost.

Leadership Symposium

The Leadership Symposium was held on February 27 & 28, 2003 at the Hampton Inn in Indianapolis. There were 10 ISFAA members nominated and elected to participate in this year's Symposium. The new graduates will be honored at the Spring 2003 Conference.

Spring Conference Site Committee

The sessions and events of the Spring 2003 conference have been finalized. Registration information has been mailed and early registration has now closed. As of March 14, 2003 147 individuals had registered to attend the conference.

Spring Conference Program Committee

The agenda and speakers have been finalized along with session times. The committee is currently in the final process of getting detailed session information to the site committee for publication in the schedule.

Internal Operations

Membership & Ethics Committee

Kirsten Reynolds, Chair, has reported that we now have 410 ISFAA members.

Long-Range Planning Committee

The 2002-2003 Long-Range Planning retreat was held on February 26 & 27, 2003. After spending time identifying issues, the participants broke up into three groups to develop some ideas for future ISFAA focus. Aldis Knight, Consultant from Purdue University facilitated the group and gave excellent input for ISFAA's future goals.

It was recommended that there be more cross work between committees as well as establishing ad hoc committees.

Marvin Smith, Chair, will have more information available to the Executive Committee at the Leadership Retreat in May.

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JoAnn Laugel made a motion that the Executive Committee endorse Long-Range plan and implement as appropriate over the course of the upcoming years. Doug Irvine seconded. Motion carried.

Nominations, Awards & Elections

Marvin Smith, Chair, has requested nominations for awards via listserv. The nominations have been discussed with the committee. Selections have been made. Marvin will confirm that the award winners will be in attendance at Spring conference. Awards will be awarded, and winners will be announced during the conference.

Sponsorship Committee

Spring conference currently has 26 exhibitors (\$8125) and \$9632.50 in sponsorship dollars. Previous spring meeting had 23 exhibitors (\$6325 and \$7315 in sponsorship dollars. Historically, the spring conference has lower attendance from vendors versus the winter meeting.

The Leadership Retreat has \$1825 in sponsorship dollars. The Membership Directory has \$1950 in sponsorship compared to \$1500 the previous year. The Newsletter has \$13,200 in sponsorship dollars compared to \$6,150 from the previous year.

In total, \$53,875 of the current \$55,950 has been collected. The outstanding \$2850 has been billed appropriately to those lenders. Reminders will be issued at the beginning of April 2003.

Public Relations College Goal Sunday

College Goal Sunday was held on February 9, 2003. CGS reported high attendance statewide with more than 4,300 Indiana students and parents attending a session in their area.

Students who attended CGS and submitted a completed evaluation form were entered into a drawing to win one of the



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three \$300 educational prizes. Winners will be announced in March, and prizes will be sent directly to the higher education institutions selected by the winners.

Counselor Workshops

Once again, the Counselor Workshops were very successful throughout the state of Indiana. A total of 612 individuals registered for the workshops. There were 14 sites available to attend.

Early Awareness

ISFAA members continue to present financial aid information to parents at middle schools across the state. The Committee will be looking at various ways to support and encourage these workshops in the coming year.

The Early Awareness Committee made plans for the ISFAA Spring 2003 conference. A panel presentation about resources and programs was developed and will be presented at the conference. The Committee membership was invited to participate in the Indiana Pathways to College Network. All current members will be included in the IPCN statewide meetings.

The last meeting of the year focused on plans for the future. Revising the middle school presentation, strengthening our communication with middle school counselors; beginning communication with parents of home-schooled students, and developing resources for Hispanic/Latino parents are some of the plans for next year.

Media Committee

The Media Committee made arrangements for Financial Aid Awareness Month (FAAM) held during February 2003. Students and families were encouraged to call the Hotline with financial aid questions during this time.

This year, 36 ISFAA members volunteered to help answer questions during the month-long event. The volunteers responded to those questions that were beyond the scope of the ICPAS hotline. Many of these calls were related to professional judgment issues.

From February I to March I0, the Hotline responded to 3,964 financial aid-related requests. Of these, 2,312 were related to the Twenty-first Century Scholars program and I,646 were related to general financial aid issues. The Hotline received 37

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calls during the broadcasts of the financial aid video on PBS stations and transferred 30 calls to ISFAA volunteers.

Newsletter

The committee met all of its goals for this year. The average size of the newsletter was over 20 pages in length. The committee began conversion of newsletter to an online version, which will be available on the ISFAA web site.

Marvin Smith motioned to develop an acceptable use policy for Newsletter Committee. This policy will cover appropriate use of material for the newsletter, printed or electronic. David Fevig seconded. Motion carried.

New Professional & Mentoring Committee

This committee is designed to recognize new members at each conference during one of the luncheons. Each new member will receive an ISFAA coaster at the time of registration. Suggestions are welcome for implementing new ways to acknowledge the new members of ISFAA.

IACAC Committee

The IACAC Congress was held October 2-4, 2002 in Indianapolis. Janis Cooprider, Indiana State University, will assume the committee Chair position for 2003-04.

High School Nights Committee

During the 2002-2003 academic year, 256 high school financial aid nights were conducted with 12,669 people in attendance. This is a decrease of 8% in sites and a decrease of 4% in attendance over the 2001-2002 academic years.

Governmental Relations

The name of a Governmental Relations committee was discussed. It was determined that the Associate Member Concerns Committee would be the Associate Member Committee. There will no longer be an Affiliate Members Committee.

OLD BUSINESS

At the last Executive Committee meeting, the issue of complimentary registrations for vendors at conferences was

discussed. A vendor who is exhibiting will be allotted one complimentary registration. This information has been forwarded to Raina Chezem, Sponsorship Chair.

NEW BUSINESS

David Fevig is working on information received from other states in regards to conference operations.

Dianne Mickey motioned that the Sponsorship Committee review current complimentary registration policies. JoAnn Laugel seconded. Motion carried.

ADJOURNMENT

Marvin Smith motioned to adjourn at 1 p.m. Dianne Mickey seconded. Meeting adjourned.

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SSACI REPORT - THE SSACI DUPLICATE PROCESS

Try as they might, some students (and on occasion some financial aid administrators completing the FAFSA on behalf of students) can't get the right combination of name, date of birth, and social security number on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA.) Realizing the mistake, a second FAFSA may be filed. This can create a duplicate record for SSACI which needs to be investigated and resolved.

Duplicates come in many forms: same name but different social security numbers or the same social security number with different names attached. This can happen within years or between years. The result is an ever growing list that needs to be researched and resolved in an effort to keep the SSACI database as clean as possible and award the correct students the most grant.

Please help the SSACI staff in this endeavor by reporting any record which may be a duplicate by providing the correct name, social security number and date of birth and its evil twin, the incorrect name, date of birth and social security number. Send an E-mail with the information to: grants@ssaci.state.in.us with the word DUPLICATE in the subject line. Your help cutting down the duplicate population is greatly appreciated.

Encourage Students To Use eStudent (www.ssaci.IN.gov/estudent/)

Information for the SSACI Edit Notification was based on the information SSACI had on file for students as of April 14, 2003. The Edit Notifications were dated April 21, 2003, sent via U.S. mail, and most were in the hands of the students before May 1, 2003. Edit corrections must be received at the proper location on or before June 2, 2003.

If FAFSA information came in to SSACI after April 14, 2003 and an edit were created, it was too late for the Edit Notification to be sent to the student. But, eStudent always contains the most up to date information available regarding applications, edits, and awards. Encourage your students to check eStudent to make sure their application is edit free and among those that SSACI will consider when awards are made in July 2003.

Edit 17 - Default or Overpayment

After June 2, 2003, the only SSACI edit which may still be corrected is Edit 17, the default or overpayment edit. If the edit were identified prior to April 14, 2003, the following edit message was sent to the student via the Edit Notification:

EDIT 17 (Default/Overpmt-SSACI Corr): The National Student Loan Data System indicates you are in default on a federal student loan and/or received an overpayment on a federal grant. Unless this default and/or overpayment status is resolved by July 1, 2003, you won't be considered for SSACI grants and scholarships. Contact the original lender, loan servicer, or school associated with the loan or call 1-800-621-3115 to resolve your default status. To resolve an overpayment, contact the school associated with the federal grant. Send documentation of the default or overpayment resolution to SSACI Edit Correction/150 West Market Street, Suite 500/Indianapolis, IN 46204. Default/Overpayment corrections must be received at SSACI on or before September 1, 2003.

The student must take care of the matter by July 1, 2003. Then SSACI must receive documentation by September 1, 2003 (receipt date) from either the school or the student showing the matter was taken care of by July 1st. Extra time is given for this edit to allow for the paperwork to reach the student from the entity that is clearing the overpayment or default and allow the student time to forward that information to SSACI.

If you know of a student placed in default or overpayment at the conclusion of the 2002-03 second semester, then you might tell the student to try to clear the matter by July 1st and get the documentation to SSACI on or before September 1st so that it does not interfere with eligibility for the 2003-04 academic year!

Help Is Just A Keystroke Away

SSACI provides information about student records via eGrads, which is a great tool to look up individual student records. Any school listed on the FAFSA has access to a student's record via eGrads. On a weekly basis, SSACI makes an electronic roster (i.e. information about lots of students) available to the student's first choice school. That can be a useful tool as well. If looking up information via the rosters, make sure that the most current roster is being reviewed and keep in mind that it is only a weekly update and the most up to date information would be found on eGrads.

Empower your front desk and phone counseling staff with the information they need to answer student questions. Make sure they have access to eGrads and that they share the eStudent (www.ssaci.lN.gov/estudent) web site address with students. Answers to most SSACI questions can be found at these sites. If not, call SSACI at 317-232-2350.

Washington, D.C. (April 25, 2003) – The National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators (NASFAA) will hold its next annual conference July 9 to 1 2, 2003, at the Salt Palace Convention Center in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Bonnie St. John, author and motivational speaker, will open the conference Wednesday, July 9, 1:00 p.m.. St. John became an amputee at age five. Pushing past her disability, she won an Olympic Silver Medal in downhill skiing in the 1984 Paralympics in Innsbruck, Austria. Her academia and business accomplishments include an honors degree from Harvard, a Rhodes Scholarship, and a position on the White House National Economic Council.

Liz Murray, recently featured in the television movie "Homeless to Harvard," will be the closing speaker Saturday, July 12, 9:00 a.m. Homeless at age 15, after the death of her mother, Murray describes how she overcame incredible odds to finish high school in just two years while living on the streets and was subsequently awarded a scholarship to Harvard.

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USAFUNDS SPONSORS SIXTH ANNUAL NATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP MONTH



The dialogue focused on efforts of USA Funds and other private-sector organizations to stem the shortage of educated workers that has been predicted to occur in the United States.

An advocate for increased corporate support of education funding, USA Funds has established its own scholarship program aimed at assisting low-income students. USA Funds this year will award up to \$3.5 million in scholarships to students from families with annual incomes of \$35,000 or less. Additionally, for the second year, USA Funds has contributed a total of \$300,000 to three national scholarship organizations that promote access to higher education for minority students.

USA Funds partnered with Scholarship America, formerly Citizens' Scholarship Foundation of America, and with other sponsors in support of the sixth annual National Scholarship Month. Scholarship America is the nation's largest private-sector scholarship and educational-support organization.

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USA Funds Projects Significant Default Rate Decrease

USA Funds® expects to record a significant decline in its student-loan default rate. Preliminary cohort default-rate figures released by the U.S. Department of Education project that USA Funds' default rate will drop to below 4.6 percent for the 2001 cohort of student-loan borrowers. The preliminary rate would represent a 25-percent decline from USA Funds' 2000 cohort rate of 6.1 percent, as well as the lowest cohort rate ever recorded by USA Funds.

The U.S. Department of Education will release final 2001 cohort default rates later this year.

The announcement follows USA Funds' recent report that its 2002 annual default rate fell below 2 percent. The cohort default rate measures the percentage of borrowers who enter repayment in a given federal fiscal year and default on their loans by the end of the following federal fiscal year. The annual default rate compares the dollars in default on loans guaranteed by USA Funds against the dollar value of all USA Fundsguaranteed loans in repayment.

Several factors contribute to USA Funds' strong defaultprevention performance. These factors include the following:

Successful default-aversion activities. Default-aversion activities undertaken on behalf of USA Funds prevent default on nearly 93 percent of seriously past-due education-loan accounts. During fiscal 2002, these efforts contributed to the aversion of nearly \$10.7 billion in potential loan defaults.

Support to postsecondary institutions. USA Funds' team of debt-management consultants offers assistance and support to help postsecondary institutions bolster their default-prevention efforts. Last year, USA Funds' Debt-Management Team conducted more than 1,200 meetings with representatives of postsecondary institutions to focus on curbing student-loan defaults. USA Funds' debt-management consultants also provided individual assistance to 150 schools and presented 62 debt-management workshops.

Innovative financial-literacy program. Life SkillsSM, USA Funds' innovative financial-literacy program, is at various stages of implementation at nearly 300 schools nationwide. Life Skills helps schools teach their students time- and money-management skills and prepare student-loan borrowers for successful repayment of their loans.

Best practices in default prevention. USA Funds also underwrites the activities of a Default-Prevention Council that brings together campus representatives and default-prevention experts to develop tactics for schools to use in lowering their default rates. The council worked with USA Funds' debt-management consultants to create the Best Practices Manual, which financial-aid professionals may access on the USA Funds Web site — www.usafunds. org — to learn strategies from schools that have implemented successful student-loan default-prevention programs.


