

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Educator Guide, 2nd Edition is on the Way

The Indiana Commission for Higher Education will be releasing soon the second edition of its Educator Guide. This year's edition will be about the Indiana College Core (Core). The Core, formerly known as the Statewide Transfer General Education Core, or STGEC, is a block of 30 credit hours of general education college-level coursework that can be transferred between all Indiana public institutions and some private institutions.

Students can earn the Core in high school for \$750 or less, saving themselves and their family thousands. Earning the Core gives students a jumpstart on their college degree or certificate, allowing them to focus on major-specific coursework earlier which may open the possibility of adding a minor, studying abroad and more.



Students who earn the Core are more likely to graduate on time or even earlier than their peers.


The Core's popularity has grown since its creation in 2012, with more than 2,000 high school students earning the Core during the 2020-21 school year. Additionally, more than 100 high schools throughout the state are officially able to offer the Core.

The Educator Guide provides guidance for high schools that are interested in becoming a delivery site for the Core.

For those schools that already offer the Core, the new guide contains information for counselors and teachers to inform students about the Core. how the earn it and how to transfer the completed Core upon graduation.

The Commission has also developed a toolkit for high schools to communicate the benefits of earning the Core to students and families. The toolkit contains an email template, sample social media posts, newsletter and website template, and FAQs about the Core.

The Commission will formally roll out the Educator Guide and toolkit in early March. These resources will be housed on LearnMoreIndiana.org and will be sent to counselors and educators via email.



President's Perspective

I recently took the gavel at the annual conference in Plainfield, and I'm very excited to get to work. I've been working hard to prepare for this year, and I think it's going to be great. I'm writing this just after our annual conference and I still feel all the warm fuzzies after being around such wonderful people in our profession. The conference was exactly what I needed to continue to energize me for this upcoming year- and I'm ready!

I do want to thank Candice Sutliff for all her hard work as president this past year. In a year where covid still exists and may be here for a while, Candice brought us through and was a strong and positive leader for our organization. She was hard at work all the way leading to the day of conference as we made final plans to hold it in person, despite the winter storm warning for much of our area.

In preparing for my role as president, Candice and I sent out a member survey to ask some questions of the membership, which has helped me prepare for the year. The results were not surprising, but reassuring that we are headed in the right direction.

Almost 85% of the people that answered the survey said it is important to them to have a professional organization for their career, and their membership is valuable to them. However, there are still members that do not know what some of our hard-working committees do for the organization. Many of our members have been able to form professional relationships with other members, but not everyone has had the same experience. Members also want to hear what's going on. We already

brought the newsletter back, and we love Bits & Bytes! (76% said they read it, so thanks for reading)

Our membership also likes the trainings we offer and our conference. It gives us the ability to keep up with the everchanging world of financial aid while discussing the impacts with our peers. We need the opportunity to meet and network, so we can share problems and solutions we encounter in our office. We are also seeing the effects of the Great Resignation, which many offices report being short staffed, unable to hire (hiring freezes), and people generally leaving the profession, through retirement or just moving on. And we know there has to be financial aid training and understanding before a new employee off the street can be effective in our offices.

It is more important than ever to strengthen our organization to make sure we are helping our financial aid colleagues retain their people- not just to make sure we are serving our students, but also to make sure we are still in compliance with having the appropriate number of staff to administer financial aid.

Although most responses to the membership survey were positive, we do have some work to do.

As a result of the membership survey and conversations with the board, we've partnered with two consultants to help us create the next strategic plan for the organization. Throughout the year, the strategic planning committee will meet and create a plan for us to roll out at the next annual conference.

1) Please tell Bits and Bytes about your current position at Purdue.

I am the Assistant Director of Packaging and Funds Management, which oversees our packaging strategy and weekly process of awarding financial aid. I have been in this role for almost 2 1/2 years and have enjoyed the critical thinking and data analysis involved in the position.

2) How did get your start in Financial Aid?

Similar to many financial aid professionals, I started as a federal work study student at Purdue University my junior year of undergrad. Our office has an incredible peer counselor program where I received extensive training and a detailed overview of financial aid. Once I finished my undergrad degree, I swore I would leave the profession but we see how well that intention worked out.

3) Tell us about your current role(s) with ISFAA and being on executive committee.

My delegate-at-large term ends this year and I now start my Treasurer-Elect term which Is a three-year commitment. While these roles vary in their responsibilities on the executive board, my overall intention for my service is to ensure that ISFAA serves our membership and our students in a comprehensive way. We have an incredible group of professionals dedicated to ISFAA and the financial aid community and it's important that the executive board continues to offer new opportunities for growth and involvement, both personally and institutionally.

4) You have been involved with financial aid since 2013. Do you have a memory about a student(s) you helped that stands out in your mind that shows the good work that FA folks do?

My most rewarding conversations have centered around the discussions with first-time students and their families. Their excitement about attending college is contagious and it's rewarding to know that our roles in financial aid can help ease some of the burden for them. I have found that simply asking a "How are you?" to students (and often parents) at the beginning of meetings typically results in more than a response of "fine!" and they tend to share their concerns openly. This initial relationship has helped make conversations more meaningful for myself and the student/family.

5) Please tell us about any other leadership roles you've had involving financial aid.

I co-chaired the ISFAA Training Committee with Lisa Bridgewater and then Sarah Owen for several years, I currently co-chair the Access, Equity, and Diversity Committee with Alex DeLonis, and I serve as the co-chair of MASFAA's Professional Development committee with Heidi Johnson from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Serving on committees has introduced me to so many people throughout the state and region and those relationships mean a lot to me! It's fun to work toward a common goal together in each of the committee roles.

6) You joined ISFAA in 2014. Please share your thoughts about the organization after 8 years as a member...

The membership makes this organization worthwhile. As I reflect on the ISFAA conference last week, I think about the conversations I had (both professional and personal) with new individuals and the connections that were made. As an organization, we are honest with each other and we hold ISFAA accountable to be the best association it can be. We constantly strive for improvement and it makes me proud to represent the organization.

7.) What is your favorite thing about your profession?

Financial aid Is an exciting mix of so many skills and responsibilities, so every day is different, which I love. I am able to counsel students and families regarding difficult situations, but also problem solve to create solutions to access and affordability efforts. Higher education is at a critical point where the industry is being asked to prove its worth to potential students and I think our role specifically will continue to grow in importance at each of our campuses.

8) Do you have a least favorite thing about your profession?

I often think that the negativity surrounding student debt casts a shadow on the financial aid profession as a whole. Since we often hear from the frustrated students/parents and not the overjoyed families, it can take a toll. My hope is that students and families have supportive conversations in each of our offices so that we can prove our profession intends to help students achieve their larger goals and not delay their progress.

9) Do you have any thought or message that you would like to pass along to the other ISFAA members?

The return on investment for volunteering is immeasurable. From the relationships built, to the leadership experience gained, to the ability to impact the larger membership, it has been one of the most rewarding decisions I have made. ISFAA has many options to be involved In different capacities based on personal comfort and Interests, and I am happy to facilitate those connections if/when anyone is interested in being more involved!



Deaths


