ISFAA as always shares a "thank you very much" message to our partners and friends from the Commission who presented at every workshop and a thank you as well to the ISFAA experts who gave their time for this important initiative at such a chaotic time.

Of course we have to give a big thank you to the schools that made it all possible again in 2023 by opening their doors and rolling out the red carpet. Without the hospitality of the host sites, there could not be a workshop series of this magnitude.

Survey responses and emails have been extremely positive (with the possible exception of wishing ISFAA could launch the FAFSA on its own) and the plan for 2024 is an even more successful series of workshops!

Throughout the year we met monthly to report our progress. We started with a 2-day meeting at the conference hotel to get a tour, and understand the layout for planning purposes. Over the course of a year, we divided up tasks and got to work. The first part of the planning was deciding on a budget. We had to figure out how to best spend money on a conference that needed to meet the needs of our members. We worked alongside the Program Committee to ensure they had the rooms they needed and the set up that would work best to deliver all the important FAFSA Simplification changes.

We were happy that Craig agreed with our committee's choice to support Foster Success. MASFAA was able to raise \$10,000 to donate to Indiana's Foster Success program, which was an amazing feat. We raised money with silent auction baskets, and an envelope drawing. It was incredible!

Many ISFAA members attended, which contributed to the over 400 attendees. Our own ISFAA President, Megan Watson, welcomed our guests on the first day of the conference. We also saw some ISFAA apparel in the crowds on Sunday.

If anyone was ever interested in event planning, this is the type of committee you should consider. You could start as a volunteer on the ISFAA conference program or site committee. Planning the conference gave me insight to something I would never know, and I got to see first-hand what it takes to pull off a large event, and it was for my professional colleagues in Financial Aid.

Indiana's Statewide FAFSA Requirement and Waiver



During the 2023 legislative session, the Indiana General Assembly passed Senate Enrolled Act (SEA) 167-2023 which requires high school seniors to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or affirmatively opt out of filing by April 15.

High school administrators and counselors can see which of their students have completed the FAFSA in real-time in ScholarTrack via the FAFSA Completion Project. Additionally, high schools will be able to report the students who choose to opt-out and those waived by the high school after April 15 via the Graduation Details upload in ScholarTrack. High schools will not be asked to verify their two attempts to contact students.

The Indiana Commission for Higher Education (Commission) will report the number of students who complete the FAFSA, opt-out and are waived by the high school to the Indiana Department of Education for inclusion on the Indiana Graduates Prepared to Succeed Dashboard.


Students who do not wish to file the FAFSA may opt out in one of the following ways:

- a parent/quardian of the student submits a FAFSA Waiver Form certifying the student understands what the FAFSA is and declines to complete it;
- the student, if the student is an emancipated minor or is at least 18 years old, submits a signed waiver certifying the student understands what the FAFSA is and declines to complete it; or
- the high school principal or counselor of the student waives the requirement due to not being able to reach the family of the student by April 15 after at least two reasonable attempts.

The FAFSA Waiver Form will be released on an annual basis on the opening day of the FAFSA. However, the Commission released this year's waiver early due to the United States Department of Education delaying the release of the 2024-25 FAFSA until December 2023. Additional information about the FAFSA requirement and waiver can be found on the Commission's website.

Students and parents can get a head start on filing by creating Federal Student Aid IDs (FSA IDs). A legal guardian of a student does not need to create an FSA ID - a parent is only required for dependent students. Visit www.FAFSA.gov to get started.

1. Please tell Bits and Bytes about your current position at IU Online

I am currently the Associate Director of Online Student Financial Services, for Indiana University Online. Our programs are hosted, collaboratively, at all Indiana campuses across the state. I support new and prospective students in determining their costs, applying for aid, and

figuring out payment options. I'm an office of one, responsible for strategic communications and support for our prospective students.

9. Do you have any thought or message that you would like to pass along to the other ISFAA members?



Indigenous People's Day Celebration

As member of the Access, Equity, and Diversity committee, I get the opportunity to research, learn, and share information and items that appear on the monthly action newsletter. This past October, I packed up my spouse, and my two very squirmy children and traveled to downtown Indianapolis. There, nestled next to the canal, we visited the <u>Eiteljorg Museum</u> to participate in their Indigenous People's Day Celebration.

We began the day listening to Storyteller Perry Ground perform two stories for us. He was magnificent at detailing how the earth was created, which turned out to be a massive part of his own tribe's culture, and how a very sneaky coyote, stole the stars in the sky. From there we spent an hour wandering and exploring the museum itself. The boys enjoyed many of the tactile, visual, and audio hands-on learning opportunities in each of the exhibits, spending the most time at the beading table. If beading or pattern making is not your thing, my personal favorite was the audio experiences. Throughout the museum, there are recordings of native speakers telling their family's story or reading curated lines of text in their native language. We ended our visit by watching traditional native dances performed



by different tribe members. These dances were beautiful expressions of the dancer's tribe's history and culture and if you have not had a chance to see it in person, I would highly recommend it.

While Indigenous People's Day was

a fun for all, rest assured that you have not missed out. You can visit the Eiteljorg, the Indiana State Museum, or other historical indigenous sites around our state (Angel Mounds, Prophetstown State Park, Mounds State Park, etc.) to learn more about this vibrant culture.
