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Thursday kicked off with our keynote speaker, Charity Lewis, Executive Director of Youth Empowered Indy, who talked with us about cultivating young minds through unconventional learning opportunities. We got to see some pictures and videos highlighting the many activities they use to teach youth. In lieu of speaker payment, ISFAA donated to Youth Empowered to help pay another cohort of young people to participate in their program activities. We offered several quality breakout sessions, from diversity to leadership, and even mental health, just to name a few. Stephen Hundley, consultant hired by ISFAA, lead a discussion about the ISFAA strategic plan and what that means for the future. This is something the ISFAA executive board had worked on over the course of a year. This presentation and the input from membership made for a great conversation about the path forward.

On Friday we started the day with additional breakout sessions. Hot Topics in Financial Aid allowed us to hear perspectives from some of our guests from NASFAA and MASFAA, including the President-elect of the Iowa Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators, Matt Falduto. The ISFAA business meeting was conducted and awards were presented. Another Successful College Goal Sunday Year!

The second and final College Goal Sunday for the 2022-23 school year took place February 26th at 37 locations across Indiana.

640 FAFSAs were filed at College Goal Sunday this year but some other event details may be the bigger story. 97% of survey respondents at the February event said they found the event helpful, following 99% saying the same thing in November! Another item of note is that 90% of fall attendees were first timers for CGS and that grew to 91% in the winter.

Distribution of FAFSAs had 423 filed in the Fall and 217 in the Winter. Not surprisingly the percentage of 21st Century Scholars was similar with 28% at the November CGS and 31% in February.

The donation of time and expertise by amazing CGS volunteers is the only way College Goal Sunday is possible, and this was again shown with 260 people stepping up in the Fall and 216 in the Winter. As always, the leadership team couldn't be more grateful for making this FAFSA filing opportunity across the entire state happen.

The final data point of note is the percentage of first-generation students at the CGS events. In November this was 41% and in February this increased to 45%.

Thank very much to every volunteer and also to every counselor who posted promotional material and those who got the word out about College Goal Sunday in different ways! Indiana's largest FAFSA filing event is only possible by a large team of incredible volunteers and ISFAA absolutely had that this year!

It's hard to believe that we're nearing the end of the 2022-2023 academic year. The last few months have been somewhat of a blur. I've been busier than ever, and I know we're inching closer to August every day.

After our conference wrapped in March, I headed over to Illinois for the MASFAA Exchange program. The ILASFAA conference was held in Champaign, IL on the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign campus. They had a great turnout, and everyone was so welcoming. I learned a lot about the Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC) and the state grant programs that are offered. I networked with schools that are working through some of the same challenges that we are all facing as we think about how we are going to calculate Cost of Attendance and prepare for the FAFSA Simplification changes. I also got to hear about best practices for building a P&P manual. The agenda for the conference was great and offered a little something for everyone.

In April & May, our Long-Range Site committee was hard at work finding potential new conference locations for ISFAA. I do want to take a moment to thank the Long-Range Site Committee for their time and efforts in soliciting proposals and bringing it back to the board for consideration. It is important to recognize that the board and conference committees took time to review the conference feedback that was provided. The survey responses indicated that the Drury was starting to feel small and that our association

may have outgrown the space. This feedback was at the center of our board discussions when we considered all proposals for next year's conference location. Thank you to everyone who took the time to complete the survey and provide feedback. I am hopeful that I will be able to share the date and location of our upcoming conference with you soon as we are in the final stages of signing a contract.

In the meantime, our conference site and program committees are busy planning our upcoming conference. You may have seen a link sent out recently to solicit ideas from membership on different program session topics. If there is something you'd like to see on the agenda next year please take a moment and share your thoughts, even if you're not able to volunteer as a presenter. Next up, our archives committee has been hard at work over the last year getting ISFAA set up to use the google suite. The board approved this change last year after carefully reviewing proposals from the archive committee. The Google Suite is free to our organization but provides us with tools that will help us work more effectively, improve communication to our membership, and provide us with cost savings going forward. Executive Committee Member Focus

1. Please tell Bits and Bytes about your current position at Purdue University Fort Wayne.

I have been the Director of Financial Aid at Purdue University Fort Wayne since end of November 2021. I oversee a staff of eleven, all in total have a combined over 100 years of financial aid experience in our office. With one team member having 30

plus years' experience to some staff members having less than one year. We serve a student body of approximately 7,000 students.

2. How did get your start in Financial Aid?

In 2006 I was getting ready to graduate from Brown Mackie College Fort Wayne with my Associate Degree in Business Management. I received a phone call from the Career Services Office asking if I wanted them to submit my resume to financial aid who had an opening for an officer role. I said yes, the day before commencement I had my second interview. One month later I started with Brown Mackie and worked there for almost eight years from: financial aid officer, senior financial aid officer, associate director, director and financial area director (where I oversaw four campuses). I have always told my employees, no one really decides they want to work in financial aid, but once you have been in financial aid more than two years, you do not leave.

3. Tell us about your current role(s) with ISFAA and being on executive committee.

I currently serve as the Training and Development Commissioner over the conference site, conference program, long range site, training, leadership symposium and access, equity and diversity committees.

4. You have been involved with financial aid for 17 years. Do you have a memory about a student(s) you helped that stands out in your mind that shows the good work that FA folks do?

Yes, I had one mother that was so terrified about her son going away to college. She called the office nearly everyday for the entire summer. Maybe once she had a question actually pertaining to financial aid. She was just so happy that someone took the time to listen to her worries, even though they were not related to our area that every year she would send the office cards for each holiday. We would see her name come up on caller ID and it no longer became answering the phone like normal, we would just answer well hello Mrs. D how is Ben doing? Do you have questions, or just checking in? I love working in an industry, where we can earn people's trust that much. Of course, we have to be careful, because we can lose it just as fast.

5. Please tell us about any other leadership roles you've had involving financial aid.

I have been Director of Financial Aid at four separate Institutions: a proprietary, two-year public, four-year private, and four-year public. I have also been an area director where I served as director for four campuses two in Indiana Fort Wayne and Indianapolis but also Miami, Florida and Atlanta, Georgia. I was also Bi-Regional Director of Financial Aid where I oversaw seven campuses at once.

6. You joined ISFAA in 2010. Please share your thoughts about the organization after 15 years as a member...

Getting involved was one of the best decisions of my career. I have grown so much as a leader because of my time, and relationships in ISFAA. I wouldn't be where I am at in my career without those in ISFAA mentoring and cheering me on. I left Indiana for two years, and I felt like a family member welcomed back when I came back to Indiana after those two years.

7. What is your favorite thing about your profession?

Something that has stuck with me ever since I heard Ben Burton say it in a meeting once. I have used this ever since when talking to people about working in financial aid. We help students finance their dreams. When students come to college to get their degree many of them have a dream of what they are going to do with that degree. We help finance those dreams, imagine what boundaries our students could go out and break after they earn their degree and we got to play a small role, how cool is that?

8. Do you have a least favorite thing about your profession?

Financial aid being used as a political tool. Don't mess with our students' futures to get re-elected.

9. Do you have any thought or message that you would like to pass along to the other ISFAA members?

Getting involved isn't just a benefit for you, it benefits the industry. Without volunteers, conferences, training, etc. do not happen. That is vital in years like this one coming up with the huge financial aid changes we have coming. You are not only building your resume and connections; you are helping to make financial aid better for those who are not involved.

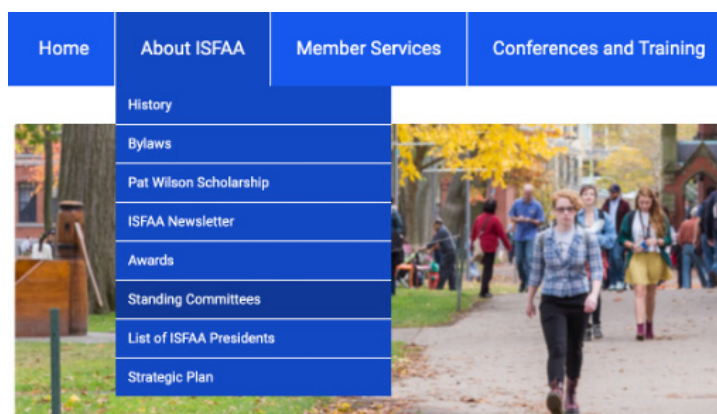
